WINTER QUARTER 2021 COURSES



In order to keep everybody safe, we continue to teach online. We are welcoming 104 enrolled students in 14 courses this quarter and are pleased to share our <u>Winter</u> <u>2021 courses</u> with you.

Some of the highlights this quarter are two NEW courses: <u>ARABIC 245 - Current Events in the Middle East</u> taught by Ragy Mikhaeel, and <u>HEBREW 245 - Current Events in</u> <u>Israel</u> taught by Hanna Tzuker-Seltzer.

In each of the new intermediate-level courses, students are exploring a variety of news topics through online news media. The students are building a comprehensive

vocabulary while exploring and learning to respect alternative topics, ideas and diversity of views as expressed in current media sources.

Both of these courses make use of the innovative learning site **Foreigncy.us**. Each lesson helps students enhance their vocabulary through an integrated flashcard program. Each student is assigned a personal language training dashboard where they can track their learning progress and save lessons and flashcards that need more work. This critical and innovative language learning tool will be used in class for interactive work and class discussions and outside of class to deepen and broaden language proficiency.

COLLABORATION WITH MENA STUDIES

The <u>MENA Languages Program</u> and the <u>MENA Studies Program</u> recently collaborated on some great events.

Arabic Language Instructor Ragy Mikhaeel's <u>ARABIC 316 - Classic Arabic Texts</u> students benefitted from a guest lecture by the <u>MENA Studies Program Director, Rebecca Johnson</u>. The topic was *Arabian Nights: A Historical Review*.

During a Fall Quarter MENA Monday Meeting, the MENA Studies faculty and graduate students and the Arabic Language instructors met virtually for an Arabic poetry translation colloquium. Interpretations of Hijāzī's work and Abū Hawwāsh's poems were discussed.

Continuing in the Winter Quarter, Hebrew Language Instructors Hanna Tzuker-Seltzer and Ronit Alexander will present at a MENA Monday Meeting on February 8 on the topic of Language as a Space of Inclusion. (<u>Click here to register.</u>) This topic is especially important as it dovetails with two crucial initiatives at Northwestern: the forthcoming Northwestern guide for inclusive teaching offering eight inclusive teaching principles and the work of the Weinberg College Inclusive Teaching Working Group co-chaired by Myrna Garcia, and Marcelo Vinces.

Other collaborative events with MENA Studies are planned for the Spring Quarter and will focus on Turkish and Persian.


Our instructors hosted guest speakers from around the world to provide language and cultural discussions for their MENA Languages students. A few of the topics are highlighted here.



Dr. Rana Raddawi arranged for cultural presentations and discussions for Arabic Language students. Ms. Nafisa Al-Sharfi, a writer and academic, shared her experience living in Sudan and Egypt before coming to the United States. Dr. Al-Hassan Diab, a young Syrian currently living in Damascus/Syria, shared personal videos and images of the sights and unique traditions in Syria, and answered students' questions about daily life as a young person living in the Middle East.

Our Hebrew Language students had the opportunity to have discussions with speakers living in Israel. Professor Sami Chetrit, a renowned poet, filmmaker, and author, was born in Morocco

and grew up in Israel: The theme of his talk was "I Am An Arab-Jew". In his talk he examined the rich Jewish-Arab history, culture, and the conflicts. Dr. Maya de Vries, currently teaching in the Department of Communication and Journalism at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, discussed the relationship between Jews and Arabs in Jerusalem, and specifically, the joys and challenges of sending her children to a Hebrew/Arabic bilingual school in Jerusalem.
