SIGNING-UP

Heba offers in-person tutoring in Kresge 4-533 and a few online tutoring sessions on Fridays if you can't meet in person. All tutoring appointments need to be scheduled through the official sign-up programs which will send a confirmation email and a reminder email to you. The ZoomID will be provided through the confirmation email.

PLEASE REMEMBER

1. Signing up is a commitment to meet

Treat your appointments as a serious commitment. If you sign up, you need to make every effort to meet the tutor.

2. 12 hrs advanced notice for changes

We understand that you are busy and appointment times may change. Let Heba know 12 hrs in advance if you need to change your appointment by emailing her.

3. Sign up early for your tutoring sessions

The sign-up program contains appointment slots for tutoring sessions for the whole quarter. Sign up early as appointment slots fill up. Heba cannot accommodate appointments outside the official schedule.
